



A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report outlines the TCDSB Student Achievement Plan for 2025-2026, a requirement of the Ministry of Education in preparation for the work in schools for the coming academic year as outlined in the Better Schools and Student Outcomes Act, 2023. This plan aligns well with the TCDSB Multi-Year Strategic Plan (MYSP) and informs the School Improvement and Equity Plan (SIEP).

The cumulative staff time required to prepare this report was 45 hours

B. PURPOSE

- 1. This report provides information on the development of the TCDSB Student Achievement Plan (TCDSB SAP) for consultation as per the Ministry of Education directive.
- 2. The plan was updated to reflect where possible and appropriate the consultation process and, when approved, will be posted publicly by June 30th, 2025, in alignment with Ministry of Education requirements.

C. BACKGROUND

- 1. The Ministry of Education, through the Better Schools and Student Outcomes Act, 2023 has mandated that every board develop a Student Achievement Plan. The plan provides a measure of accountability for school board districts.
- 2. The TCDSB SAP is designed to provide a consistent set of performance indicators emphasizing student achievement, future success, and engagement and well-being outcomes. The plan ensures that strategic planning and policy development are data driven. The SAP includes input from families and communities to promote transparency in school boards.
- 3. The plan has three main areas to be monitored:
 - a. Achievement of Learning Outcomes in Core Academic Skills;
 - b. Preparation of Students for Future Success, and
 - c. Student Engagement and Well-Being.
- 4. For each area tracked, the Ministry of Education has identified several metrics that will be gathered over time to inform the work of district school boards. Some metrics are part of our ongoing work (e.g., EQAO achievement data) while other metrics are captured through varied collection processes identified by the Ministry of Education.

- 5. In April 2025, the Ministry of Education staff provided updated information regarding the requirements of the SAP, including the data used on the report, the reporting format and the approach to consultation.
 - a. Data from 2023-2024 EQAO Assessments was used as indicators for Literacy and Math achievement in the focus area of "Achievement of Learning Outcomes in Core Academic Skills".
 - b. Data from 2022-2023 and/or 2023-2024 was used to support the areas of "Preparation of Students for Future Success" and "Student Engagement & Well-Being".
- 6. District school boards were required to publicly post a draft/working copy of their Student Achievement Plan for the purposes of consultation by April 30th, 2025.
- 7. Academic staff in collaboration with the Communications department developed a survey for consulting with parents and multiple stakeholders on the draft plan. The survey was conducted from April 25th to May 9th, 2025.
- 8. The research department analysed the results and staff has used these to inform the final plan. The approved plan will be posted by the end of June 2025.

D. EVIDENCE/RESEARCH/ANALYSIS

- 1. After posting the draft plan on the TCDSB website on April 25th, the TCDSB SAP was brought to the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC), the Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (CPIC) and the Catholic Student Leadership Impact Team (CSLIT) for awareness and consultation.
- 2. The TCDSB Student Achievement Plan went out for consultation through a survey on April 25th to all parents and stakeholder groups (e.g., CSPC, CPIC, SEAC, Advisory committees, Federations, Associations, Trustees). While parents were sent the survey through School Messenger, members of stakeholder groups were sent the survey directly.
- 3. Respondents were asked to read a landing page that contained links to strategic plans for reference. They were then asked to review the plan and answer the survey. There were five closed-ended questions and one open-ended question for additional comments. Filling out the survey was voluntary. All answers were anonymous and confidential and are summarized at a group (board) level.
- 4. A total of 2,283 participants responded to the TCDSB Student Achievement Plan Survey. Of this total, 18 % were community members while 82% were parents/guardians.

5. The closed-ended questions asked responders whether the actions outlined by TCDSB were aligned with the information provided within the plan. (See results in Table 1).

6. Participants also had the opportunity to provide comments on the survey. In total, 756 comments were made in the open-ended question, (approximately 75% from parents and 25% from Community Members). The following are some themes that emerged from the open-ended question in the survey:

• Returning to Academic Fundamentals:

- Emphasis on returning to the basics and specifically reviewing math programs
- Call for direct instruction in core subjects such as math, reading and writing

• Improved support for students with exceptionalities

- Ensuring implementation of IEPs in the classroom for students with exceptionalities, including instruction and assessment practices
- Accessing human resources and material resources to support students
- More Meaningful Mental Health and Anti-bullying initiatives

- o Emphasis on access to Mental Health services beyond promotional programs
- o Continue to focus on promoting anti-bullying initiatives

• Strengthening Academic Foundations and Resources

- Continue consistent support for intervention programs such as 5th block and Knowledgehook
- Expanding Early Reading and Mathematics interventions

• Expanded and equitable student support services

- Providing students with counselling and mental health supports as needed, including access to mental health professionals, social workers and guidance counsellor-teachers
- Equitable access to supports for students with Individual Education Plans and English Language Learners

• Enhanced student engagement and instructional quality

- o Ensuring access to physical activity for student engagement with greater emphasis on gym, outdoor activities, field trips, sports and other enrichment opportunities
- 7. Feedback from the survey was used to update the plan. (See Appendix A)

E. METRICS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

- 1. The TCDSB Student Achievement Plan provides data on TCDSB achievement in relation to the ministry-selected metrics. It also provides boards with the opportunity to include comments on specific subgroups of our populations (e.g., English Language Learners, Students with Special Needs, Students from low-income neighbourhoods).
- 2. The plan provides district school boards with the opportunity to list some of the actions they are taking to address the needs in the system. While the template provides only limited space to outline some of the professional learning and opportunities that are provided to staff and students, the plan references our TCDSB Action plans (e.g., Math Achievement Action Plan, Equity Action Plan, Special Services Action Plan, Mental Health Action Plan, Professional Learning Plans etc.) that also outline steps taken to support student learning and well-being.
- 3. In line with the survey comments, schools are operationalizing this work at the local school level through the development of School Improvement and Equity

- Plans (SIEP) that are responsive to the local school and community needs. Schools have been developing a SIEP on an annual basis since 2022-2023 and have been consulting with their parent councils and school Superintendents regarding the focus of their plan.
- 4. The Ministry encourages district school boards to continue work in areas that are not specifically outlined in the Student Achievement Plan template, but that are integral to the board's communities. As such, we will continue to include Equity as it aligns with the MYSP in our day-to-day work as outlined in the school's SIEP.
- 5. In the Fall, schools will develop and implement a SIEP that will be responsive to each community's needs, reflecting the local student population and the parent community's priorities.
- 6. Additionally, central academic staff will provide professional learning opportunities for staff (as outlined in the annual Professional Learning Plan) and in special events for students to support the work at the school.
- 7. The approved TCDSB Student Achievement Plan will be publicly posted on the TCDSB board site and each school's SIEP posted on their respective school site. The plan will be reviewed annually and consulted on as appropriate for implementation. The outcomes of the plan are reported annually to the Board of Trustees.

F. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends adoption of the Student Achievement Plan for 2025-2026 as outlined in Appendix A.





Goal: Improve students' math learning and achievement





A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As per Board policy T.02, there is an annual election process for the selection of a new Student Trustee. Policy T.02 was revised and approved by the Board of Trustees on February 19, 2015. Invitations for nominations for the position of Student Trustee were sent to all TCDSB secondary schools. The student trustee will serve two successive one-year terms.

The cumulative staff time required to prepare this report was 3 hours

B. PURPOSE

1. This report is on the Order Paper of the Student Achievement and Well Being, Catholic Education and Human Resources Committee for the approval of the Student Trustee appointment required under Board policy T.02, Student Trustee.

C. BACKGROUND

- 1. An email was sent to all secondary school Principals and Vice Principals on March 6th, 2025, outlining the election process for Student Trustee. The administration team also received an application form for interested grade 10 students to apply.
- 2. The Student Trustee election process was outlined to Catholic Student Leadership Impact Team (CSLIT) members at the Student Council Central meeting on December 17, 2024, and at the CSLIT General Assembly meeting on February 25, 2025.
- 3. CSLIT uploaded social media content and a video introducing each candidate throughout the month of April to provide the general assembly more information about each candidate before the April 29, 2025 election.
- 4. The term for the current Student Trustee JoyGold Goodluck ends July 31, 2025.

D.EVIDENCE/RESEARCH/ANALYSIS

1. The candidate names that appeared on the ballot were:

- 2. Student leaders from across the TCDSB met on April 29th, 2025, at Cardinal Carter Academy for the Arts Secondary School for their monthly CSLIT general assembly meeting. The general assembly meeting opened with a welcome from CSLIT executive, highlighting the importance of student voice when electing the next student trustee.
 - All candidates had the opportunity to address the general assembly with a 4-minute speech which included candidate goals, qualifications, and experience related to student leadership and the position of student trustee.
 - Individual candidates participated in a question-and-answer session conducted by the current student trustees. Each candidate answered identical questions. Candidates on deck waited in a separate room unable to hear what questions were being asked without access to their phones.
 - Each school was given one ballot.
 - In order for the election to be valid, at least 17 schools must participate in the vote, as per TCDSB policy.
 - Voting was conducted using the <u>Alternative Vote</u> process outlined prior to the vote and a video was shown to explain the process.

- 3. The counting of the votes was conducted by the Catholic Student Leadership Resource Teacher. The current student trustees witnessed the counting of the ballots.
- 4. When the Board of Trustees ratifies the appointment of the Student Trustee elect:
 - The successful candidate will be officially notified by letter.
 - Appropriate announcements will be made within the TCDSB.
 - Notifications will be sent to all Student Council representatives, the Ontario Catholic Student Council Federation, and the Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association.
 - Letters of appreciation will be sent to those Student Trustee candidates who put their name forward. Candidates will be invited to apply for next year's CSLIT Executive
 - Prior to the start of their term on August 1, 2025, briefing sessions and arrangements for providing equipment to the new Student Trustees will occur.
 - The newly elected student trustee will have the opportunity to attend several Board Standing Committee meetings and Regular Board meetings, prior to officially taking office as Student Trustee.
 - This appointment will allow for a transition period from May 2025 to July 31, 2025.

E. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

That the Board of Trustees appoint Vianca Vacheresse from Loretto Abbey Catholic Secondary School as Student Trustee for the term August 1, 2025, through to July 31, 2027.



A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

According to the TCDSB Smoke and Vapour Free Space Policy, the TCDSB is committed to the provision of a smoke, vapour and tobacco free environment in all premises and on all properties, owned and/or operated by the Board. The data relating to the 2024/2025 academic year indicate a decrease in incidents for secondary students for infractions of this policy, and a slight increase in incidents for elementary students.

The cumulative staff time required to prepare this report was 10 hours.

B. PURPOSE

Consistent with the Smoke and Vapour Free Space Policy, an annual report is presented to the Board of Trustees by staff detailing compliance and infractions.

C. BACKGROUND

- 1. The TCDSB Smoke and Vapour Free Space Policy was revised in May 2016 to include, under the evaluation and metrics section, the requirement of an annual report detailing compliance and infractions of this policy. The policy was further revised in March 2019 to include references to vaping and the use of cannabis.
- 2. The Tobacco Enforcement Department of the Toronto Public Health Department does not publicly release the total number of school infractions under the Smoke Free Ontario Act.
- 3. Data was collected from the Safe Schools Progressive Discipline Platform to provide an analysis of smoking-related incidents that occurred during the 2024/2025 academic year.
- 4. Annually, TCDSB principals have been responding to a survey containing questions related to the compliance and number of infractions associated with this policy.
- 5. In April 2024, the survey was administered once again.
- 6. Policy/Program Memorandum (PPM) 128 *The Provincial Code of Conduct and School Board Codes of Conduct* was revised April 28, 2024. Changes to this PPM were effective September 1, 2024, with implications on the possession, use and provision of tobacco, electronic cigarettes, nicotine products, recreational

- cannabis, alcohol and illegal drugs. The Smoke and Vapour Free Space Policy was reviewed and updated in June 2024 to ensure compliance with the PPM.
- 7. The Ministry of Education has provided funding for the installation of vape detectors.

D. EVIDENCE/RESEARCH/ANALYSIS

1. This year's survey results indicate a decrease in incidents for secondary students, and a slight increase for elementary students. The chart below indicates the number of incidents since 2020-2021 in both elementary and secondary schools:

- 2. Highlights from the 2024-2025 survey are included below:
 - Surveys were completed by all elementary and secondary schools
 - 30.3% of respondents (60 schools) indicated a requirement for additional signs at the entrances and exits of their school locations
 - The incidents noted above involve 36 schools
 - Schools communicate the policy on smoking/vaping mainly through the following channels:
 - Staff meetings
 - Student agenda books
 - PA announcements
 - Newsletters
 - Emails
 - Assemblies
- 3. Schools will continue to build awareness among students, families and staff about the Board's policies on smoking/vaping through an increased use of communication and engagement strategies as listed above, including the provision of information that outlines the dangers and consequences of substance use, misuse, addictions, and related behaviours.

- 4. Environmental Support Services (ESS) is initiating a pilot project which will involve the installation of vape detectors in four (4) secondary schools: Michael Power, Marshall McLuhan, Senator O'Connor and St John Paul II. The impact of this project will be monitored to determine its effectiveness in addressing vaping in school washrooms.
- 5. ESS will also continue to work with all schools through their area Service Quality Supervisors (SQS) to ensure that the proper signage is posted at each entrance location for their school building. Signage specific to vaping has been distributed to secondary schools for posting in washrooms.
- 6. Strategies and resources are shared with administrators and staff to address smoking and vaping concerns. Vigilance and frequent monitoring by administrators and staff (in-person and via video hallway surveillance), as well as the implementation of progressive discipline measures, where appropriate, continue to be emphasized. Curriculum and professional learning resources have been shared with administrators and staff relating to substance use, misuse, addictions, and related behaviours.
- 7. The Health and Physical Education, Curriculum, Mental Health and Wellbeing, Nurturing Our Catholic Community and Safe Schools Departments continue to help support student safety, promote healthy decision-making for students, and prevent and/or delay smoking, recreational cannabis use and vaping. Initiatives, activities and events for administrators, teachers, support and clinical staff, students and parents serve as the conduits for this learning.
- 8. Ongoing professional development on "Mental Health, Substance Use and the Relationship Between Them" is provided to Grade 7 and 8 Health and Physical Education Teachers to build capacity for teaching mandatory student mental health literacy modules.
- 9. Students in all secondary schools and in 90 elementary schools continue to be engaged in STOMP (Students Together Moving to Prevent Tobacco Use), a multi-year pilot project (2021-2025) that takes a comprehensive approach to curb commercial tobacco (and vaping) use by targeting the student population and its unique characteristics, norms, and needs directly. Students in grades 7-12 work with school staff and community leaders to co-create a grassroots approach to reducing commercial tobacco use in their school community. STOMP Resource Kit tools and resources are provided to build awareness about tobacco and vaping use as well as to educate about healthy habits.
- 10. Collaborations continue with community agencies such as Breakaway Community Services and Toronto Public Health which offer classroom workshops and presentations on substance use and prevention from a harm reduction approach.

11. Staff will continue to work with the Student Trustees and the Catholic Student Leadership Impact Team (CSLIT) to develop awareness building strategies discouraging substance use.

E. METRICS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

An annual report as required by Policy B.B. 04 is presented to the Board.
